THREE-MINUTE TIP by JJ Jordan

Despite the unsettled state of affairs surrounding the Coronavirus, the time for planning our gardens is here.

A while back I wrote a Three-Minute Tip on using packing "peanuts" as a space saver in the bottom of

containers so that less soil is used in those planting. Using the "peanuts" brought on several problems. They either decomposed allowing the soil level to drop or were a mess when trying to replant for the next season.

Recently I came across an even better "space saver" and one that will reuse plastic containers, saving our landfills as

well. Instead of throwing those juice jugs, water bottles, and other plastic containers, wash them out and seal them. Then use them in the bottom of your



container planters. Doing this will require even less soil, allow better drainage, not require rocks for drainage, and because the planters will be much lighter will allow for easier moving of your finished garden.

Keep safe and healthy and enjoy your gardens during these inconvenient times.

How to Read a Nursery Plant Tag

As you wander the rows of beautiful plants at Strange's or The Great Big Greenhouse, the huge variety, in their many colors, leaf variations and sizes, can be overwhelming. Which plant will work best in your garden? How many plants should you put in that container? Is this an annual or a perennial?

Plant tags are there to help you make informed decisions about the plants you purchase. They contain information on size, bloom time, light and water requirements. They also include the information that you need to fill out your exhibit card for garden club. Understanding how to read plant tags is key to making good choices.

Annual or Perennial - Annuals are not expected to live through the winter and will need to be replanted every year. Perennials can over-winter and will return year after year.

Common Name - The common name of the plant is the usually the largest printing on the tag. It is the name that the plant is know by for most people. Most plants have more than one common name and the common name can be different in different areas of the county/world.

Botanical Name - The botanical name is the scientific name of the plant. It is written in Latin and will be printed in italics. When writing the botanical name, it should be underlined. The botanical name will include the genius (group) and species of the plant. Sometimes It will also contain the cultivar, which is written in ingle quotation marks. This is the name that should go on your exhibit card for horticulture.


Bloom Time - The bloom time will tell you not only when to expect blooms but also how long the blooming season is.

Light Requirement - The light requirement will tell you how much sun exposure the plant requires to thrive. It will usually be expresses as a certain number of hours of sun per day or as shade, part shade, part sun or full sun.

Water Requirement - The water requirement tells the gardener how much water the plant requires. This is a good indicator as to whether the soil needs to be kept damp or allowed to dry out between waterings.

Size - The maximum height and spread of the plant is often listed. This gives you an idea of how close to space the plant to others. It will also let you know whether it should be planted in front of or behind other plants.

Hardiness - The tag will list the coldest zone in which the plant can survive or perhaps the zone range in which it lives. We live in zone 7B. Many annuals do not list hardiness zone as they are not expected to last beyond one season.
